# Animal Rescue

In 2024, the ARL took an important step forward in our Animal Welfare & Response operations with the launch of a two-phase capital campaign to expand our rescue facilities. We ended the year with Phase 1 underway and our horses and barn animals moving to a new 21-acre Second Chance Ranch near the ARL's main campus. With your help, renovations to the new ranch will continue in 2025, and we'll kick off Phase 2 of the project, transforming the previous ranch into a Rescue Intake & Rehabilitation Center dedicated to helping animals from large-scale rescues recover.

# You Provided 400+ Second Chances

Calls for animal rescues continued to pour in from across the state in 2024, and our rescue teams assisted authorities with cases from puppy mills to hoarding situations to other illegal and inhumane activities. A total of 414 animals were rescued from cruelty, and our veterinary team also dealt with a host of challenging medical cases, giving even more pets second chances. Here are some of the lives you changed.





#### YOU WERE PART OF THE NORWALK RESCUE

The ARL's Animal Welfare & Response team responded to an urgent call from Norwalk Police, removing 57 dogs and 3 cats from horrible conditions. The dogs spent weeks in the care of our Miracle Medical Team, where they received treatment for painful skin conditions, as well as dental and orthopedic surgeries. It took weeks for many to recover and find homes.

#### YOU ARE THE HERO OF BRUCE'S STORY

Bruce, a draft horse, was shockingly thin and being forced to pull a carriage in Des Moines in 90-degree heat when ARL Animal Services officers arrived. An equine vet determined he was at least 500 pounds underweight. Bruce spent weeks at our Second Chance Ranch gaining weight and is now in a loving home. His owner was charged with neglect.





#### BUG FOUND HIS QUILLS THANKS TO YOU

Bug the hedgehog arrived missing almost all of his quills. Tests showed he was suffering from a severe mite infestation. After starting treatment, we placed him in an experienced foster home, where he received medicated baths, a special diet to promote healing, and a habitat that catered to his needs. His guills slowly grew back, and after 6 months in our care he was healthy enough to be adopted. He now has a new family.



#### YOU PROVIDED HEALING AND SAFETY

The ARL assisted Mason City Police in rescuing nearly 30 cats trapped in a van in extreme heat in August. The cats were living in toxic conditions and had no access to food and water. Some were suffering from serious injuries and illnesses, including respiratory and eye infections. Some of the cats were in our care for months recovering, and most have now been adopted. The cats' owner pleaded guilty to animal neglect.

The last several years have been challenging with a continued high dog population in our shelter. Despite this, in 2024 we were still able to achieve a 90% live release rate for dogs. 2024 was also a challenging year for cats, with large numbers of kittens arriving with panleukopenia (feline distemper), a terrible disease with a high mortality rate. Sadly, despite our best efforts, many of these extremely ill kittens did not survive. We also took in large numbers of cats from severe hoarding environments that were sadly not survivable.

#### Reasons for Euthanasia

The ARL looks at every animal as an individual and not a number and determines a treatment or rehabilitation plan. We only euthanize animals that are dangerous or suffering, and only after we have exhausted all other humane and responsible options. We do not euthanize for space and there are no time limits on the animals in our care.

<sup>2</sup> Does not include owner-requested euthanasia.

<sup>3</sup> The number of intakes will not necessarily equal the number of outcomes over the course of a year. The difference represents a net increase or decrease in the number of animals in our care at the beginning of the period and at the end.



## **Shelter Successes**

- January: Moved into new ARL Animal Services location that includes an adoption center and medical suite
- June: Launched our Kitten Nursery, which provided specialized care to nearly 600 of our most fragile kittens
- August: Spayed our 3,000th community cat as part of Operation CatSnip, our trap-neuter-return (TNR) program
- December: Celebrated a big year of adoptions, with a record 5,026 cats and a record 62 horses finding homes

# Keeping Families Together

Thanks to you, we expanded our low-cost community Wellness Clinics beyond vaccines and microchipping to provide even more services to help keep pets with the families who love them. We also formed new veterinarian partnerships to more than double our spay/neuter surgeries for owned pets. In 2024:

- 930 Pets received lifesaving vaccines
- 829 Pets were microchipped
- 487 Pets were spayed/neutered
- 363 Pets received veterinary assistance
- 31 Pets were fostered in our Crisis Care program


